

Abrasive wheel safety: what should you check?

Quick workplace checklist for employers, managers and operators

Use this quick checklist to sense-check whether abrasive wheels are being selected, maintained and used safely at work. It is a practical prompt, not a substitute for a full risk assessment, practical instruction or supervision.

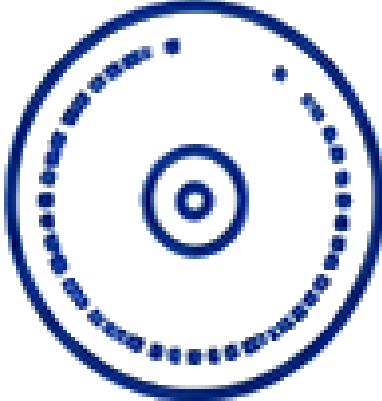

Training and competence

- ☐ Are operators trained to use abrasive-wheel equipment safely?
- ☐ Is training appropriate for the equipment, task and level of risk?
- ☐ Is practical instruction provided where workers mount or change wheels?
- ☐ Is refresher training given when equipment, risks or working practices change?

Wheel selection

- ☐ Is the wheel suitable for the machine, material and task?
- ☐ Is the wheel's specification and speed rating correct?
- ☐ Are compatible accessories and fittings being used?

Checks before use

- ☐ Is the wheel free from cracks, damage or deterioration?
- ☐ Has the wheel been stored and handled correctly?
- ☐ Are pre-use checks completed before work starts?

Machine condition and maintenance

- ☐ Is the grinder or machine in safe working condition?
- ☐ Are maintenance and repairs carried out by competent people?
- ☐ Are manufacturer instructions being followed?

Guards and safe operation

- ☐ Are suitable guards fitted and used?
- ☐ Are safe systems of work in place?
- ☐ Are bystanders protected from sparks, fragments and contact with the wheel?

Exposure controls

- ☐ Have dust, noise and vibration risks been assessed?
- ☐ Are appropriate controls in place to reduce exposure?
- ☐ Is suitable PPE provided and used where needed?

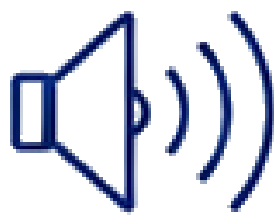
